WHAT'S SPECIAL ABOUT OUR WELL WATER?

Do you know the difference between Well water and City water? Here are some of the key reasons why our precious water source is among the most natural and healthiest around. Lucky us!

WELL WATER

- Sourced from ground water
- Naturally filtered by the aquifer
- Treated minimally with chlorine
- Extremely low risk of contamination due to less travel

CITY WATER

- Sourced from surface water
- Filtered by treatment facilities
- Treated with chlorine, ozone and chlorine a second time
- Slightly higher risk of contamination

GET INVOLVED! WATER DISTRICT COMMUNITY MEETINGS

Las Vegas Valley Water District (LVWD) staff will be hosting three (3) informational community workshops for residents and businesses in Blue Diamond Village.

Topics to be covered at each workshop will include:

- Necessary water system improvement projects
- Funding of water system improvements
- Proposed water rate changes for the community

A rate adjustment is necessary to incentivize water conservation and fund future capital needs. LVWD staff will solicit community feedback on new water rates at EACH workshop, as well at the RRCAC meeting on May 26, 2021. Each workshop will go over the same information, so we recommend you choose only one to attend.
